## Thanks and Farewell to Founding Members Virginia & Jean

We want to say thanks and wish a farewell to Virginia Hatch, who is moving out of the area, and Jean Olson, who is retiring as Arts Council treasurer. These ladies are founding members of the Arlington Arts Council and have been close friends since 2003.

During the City's Centennial Celebration in 2003, Virginia and Jean volunteered to be on the committee to plan events and projects for the centennial. They commissioned and installed many of the murals seen downtown today. From that committee, they formed the Arlington Arts Council with Sarah Arney, and continued the focus of adding sculptures and murals to Arlington through lots of hard work and fundraising.

Over most of the past 20 years the Arts Council held fundraising auctions to raise money for public art installations. Virginia and Jean were integral to the planning and leadership of the auction events. Since the City has implemented funding public art, there hasn't been a need for the annual auction. Jean has been the treasurer of AAC since 2003 and is ready for retirement from the duty.

Their hard work over the past 20 years has enhanced Arlington and set the path of beautification and improvement in our community.



Although both Virginia and Jean have admitted to not being artistic, they are sincere advocates of art. Virginia donated a sculpture named Dedicated to the Beauty of Earth, located on the Centennial Trail. Jean wrote a Haiku poem that is imprinted on a stone at Terrace Park.

# Arlington-Stillaguamish Eagle Festival Art Show, Poetry & Photo Contest

Saturday, February 3, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Olympic Theater Cafe, 107 S. Olympic Avenue in downtown Arlington. The Show features depictions of the beautiful Pacific Northwest flora and fauna as created by local artists in all media types. Sponsored by the Arlington Arts Council.

Community artists of all ages are encouraged to enter art in AAC's Nature Art Show for the Eagle Festival.

The Eagle Photo Contest offers a \$200 cash prize for the judges' choice of the best eagle photo and \$100 cash prizes for the Best Nature Photo, for the Best Nature Art 2D and for the Best Nature Art 3D (sculptures and other media). Artists can enter up to four works of art but only one eagle photo for the Eagle Photo Contest. Entry fee is \$5 per piece of art.

**Youth** are encouraged to enter art and can win \$50 in one of two age categories, up to 10 and 11-17. For youth, entry fee is a donation to the food bank.

Entries must be delivered to the Olympic Theater Cafe at 107 N. Olympic Ave. from 3 to 7 p.m. Friday, Feb. 2; artists must be prepared to pick up their work at 4 p.m. Saturday. If not picked up by 5 p.m., it will be donated.

The art show is open to the public all day Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. There will be a small silent auction and a couple of raffle baskets to raise funds for Arlington Arts Council operations.

Also, don't miss the chainsaw carvers across the street; they will be carving away for three days, Thursday through Saturday, ending with an auction.

#### Haiku contest

Also during Arlington's Stillaguamish Eagle Festival, AAC welcomes poets of all ages to write haiku poems about nature and/or eagles, with \$50 cash prizes in two categories: youth up to 17 and adults, 18 and up. Submit prior to festival online at www.arlingtowa.gov/eaglefest.

Haiku are short poems of three lines, the first line of five syllables, the second has seven syllables and the third line has five syllables. By Japanese tradition, haiku are nature based, non-rhyming, with a surprise ending.

#### Art Activity for Kids

During the festival, Arts Council members will host a free art activity for children, usually involving painting on wood critters made by Mike Nordine. Volunteers are welcome to help at the event. Contact Sarah Lopez at slopez@arlingtonwa.gov.
