#### **Eagle Photo & Nature Art Show**

Last year's eagle photo contest winner, Dave Govan is featured on the festival poster this year, as per tradition over the past 10 years. All the prize-winning eagle photos will be displayed at the art show, opened to all, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 5, at the Olympic Theater Cafe, 107 N. Olympic Ave., hosted by Lifeway Church.

Artists of all ages from Snohomish, Island and Skagit counties are invited to enter one eagle photograph and a total of four works of nature art in any media. Deliver your art from 3 to 7 p.m. Friday, Feb. 4 at the Olympic Theater.

Cash rewards include \$200 for best eagle, \$100 for best nature art and \$100 for best of show.

Entry fee is \$5 per piece and for kids under 18, entry fee is a can of food for the food bank. All art must be ready to hang with wires, and must be picked up at 4 p.m. Saturday.

The art show will be a stop on the Eagle Quest, a project of the Stilly Valley Chamber of Commerce.

AAC will be offering a raffle basket full of wine to raise funds for operations.

Community artists are also invited to paint nature art on boards provided by the city for an outdoor exhibit to be displayed on the fence in the 400 block of the Centennial Trail. Get your boards to paint at City Hall.

AAC will also offer cash prizes for the best haiku poems.

We must thank city engineer **Ryan Morrison** for his schematic drawing of the plaza that served as a vision for the project. Also, thanks to **Arlington City** 

**Council** for funding construction of the plaza with the city's Public Art Fund. Thanks to **Sarah Lopez** for managing the project and asking the right questions at the right time. A local tile layer, **Doug Drier** served as installation assistant. Also thanks to **Brandon and Aaron Zachry, Jason Leatherman and Randy Dillenbech, at Cuz Concrete,** for figuring out how to build an obelisk. **Tyler Andrews, at PNW Civil Engineering** engineered and constructed the



plaza to hold the obelisk. AND thanks to Jean Olson, Marilyn Oertle and Sarah Arney for the vision—they were inspired by a Peace Pole in Zihuatanejo several years ago. In a surprise announcement by Jean Olson during the unveiling, the Peace Plaza has been dedicated to AAC founding president Sarah Arney.

#### SMA Art Advocate of Arlington Awards finalized

Over the past 10 years, Arlington Arts Council has honored community members who have contributed to our mission to bring art to Arlington, with each annual art advocate placed on a plaque created by glass artist Kurt McVay and displayed in the mayor's office. Starting in 2009, Jean Olson and Terry Marsh were honored for all their hard work on the community fish art project; In 2010, Paul Nyenhuis was honored for offering his flute music at events; In 2011 Mayor Margaret Larson was selected for her ongoing support of AAC efforts; In 2012, Norma Pappas was honored for bringing the art of movies to town; In 2013, it was **Heather Logan**, who, as administrator of Cascade Valley Hospital, led the effort to select art for the expansion of the hospital; In 2014, Glen Zachry was named for Cuz Concrete's assistance in providing concrete pads for sculptures; In 2015, George Boulton was honored for his ongoing support of the arts in Arlington; In 2016 Jeff Nicely was named for his efforts to bring the art of blues music to town; In 2017 Public Works Director Jim **Kelly** was named art advocate of the year after he offered to include art in the 67th Avenue road project; In 2018, we honored Johnny Green and all those who helped build the stage in Legion Park; In 2019 Mayor Barb Tolbert was named art advocate for her support of the ordinance for public art in Arlington; And finally the last spot on the plaque, went in 2020 to the Arlington Arts Council itself.

#### Graffiti under the bridge

At left, AAC Vice President Monica Bretherton repaired the **"Going to Ride"** mural designed by Janet Myer and painted by arts council members several years ago. The mural on the pillar under Haller Bridge was damaged last summer by graffiti and also had some limestone drippings from the concrete pillar. Monica painstakingly scrubbed and scraped the graffiti markings as well as limestone drippings.



The **Leaping Bunnies**, designed by Sarah Arney, were installed last summer and they appeared to have some bullet wounds, but luckily they were stickers that could be easily removed. At right, **"Eagles Return Home"** by Caroline Sumpter was installed early last year at the ponds at 67th Avenue entrance to Gleneagle, a project coordinated by the Gleneagle Homeowners Landscaping Committee.
